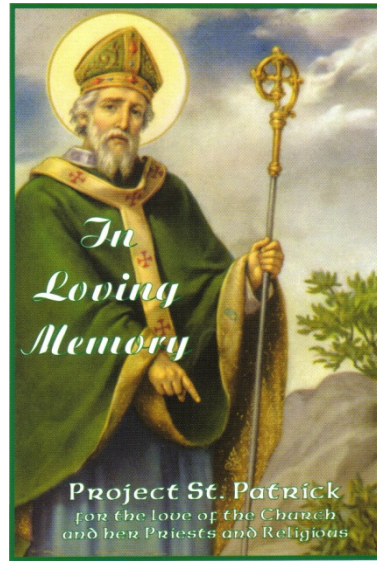

Irish Heritage

Sweeney Clan



Clan Sweeney is an [Irish clan](#) of [Scottish](#) origin. The clan did not permanently settle in [Ireland](#) before the beginning of the fourteenth century, when they became [Gallowglass](#) soldiers for the [O'Donnell dynasty](#) of [Tyrconnell](#).¹

The Gaelic surname "[Suibhne](#)" (derived from the Clann tSuibhne of Ireland and Scotland) was a real challenge to the spelling skills of

early American record keepers. So if you were born in the USA - whether you are a Swinney, Swinny, Swiney, Swinea, Swinnea, Swenney, Sweney, or Sweny - you are probably a descendant of the early "Suibhne" migrations of the 17th and 18th centuries.

The Clann tSuibhne descends from the Irish High King Niall of the Nine Hostages (4th and 5th century). Two of his sons assumed power in the North in areas which adopted their names: Tír Connell and Tír Eoin. Families descended from them are known as the Northern Úa Niall and include the O'Neills, O'Donnells, the Suibhnes and others.

A few centuries later, around the turn of the last millenium, the clan moved to Scotland over a dispute regarding a Kingship succession. The clan prospered in Scotland, gaining lands in Cowal and Knapdale in Argyle and building Castle Sween on Lough Sween. The clan kept up their Irish ties through marriage and (after backing the wrong side at Bannockburn when Robert the Bruce assumed the throne in Scotland) largely returned to

Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork The Triumph and Tragedy of the Hunger Strike

The hunger strike is a weapon which is designed to turn weakness into strength, a political and propaganda tool which has the power to cast the striking prisoners as victims and the government being struck against as the oppressor. The hunger strike has been used particularly often, and taken to deadly extremes, by Republicans seeking freedom for Ireland in the twentieth century. The most prominent and influential hunger strike, and one of the earliest, was that of Terence MacSwiney, the Lord Mayor of Cork. MacSwiney died on hunger strike in 1920, while a prisoner of the British government. Although the strike failed to achieve its stated aim of MacSwiney's release, his death was a major blow to the British government, and marked a turning point in the Irish War of Independence. MacSwiney's sacrifice changed the way the public in Ireland and around the world viewed the struggle for independence: he came to symbolize Ireland itself. MacSwiney's "martyrdom" was thus a triumph in the struggle for Irish independence, but this triumph could only be achieved through the deaths of MacSwiney and two of his fellow-strikers, who never lived to enjoy the freedom they helped to win. More tragically, MacSwiney's success inspired generation after generation of Irish Republicans to sacrifice their own lives, but never again with the same triumphant outcome. MacSwiney's "victory" was a fortuitous result of unique circumstances. MacSwiney was a public servant at a time when the war was reaching its climax, and one of the first to carry a hunger strike through to its conclusion; his cause thus achieved a greater urgency and impact than any other hunger striker.

Ireland ends free Guinness after blood donation

One of Ireland's most unusual traditions, drinking a free pint of Guinness after donating blood, is to be ended. Diageo, the Guinness parent company, has decided to end the tradition. "We felt this style and type of donation was not best suited to us now," said Grainne Mackin, for Diageo. "Guinness has long stopped promoting the product as medicinal and we want to be in full alignment with our voluntary marketing code. It wasn't driven by any commercial agenda."



Paddy Bowler, the director of operations at the Irish Blood Transfusion Services, agreed. "The government is going to lower the blood alcohol limits for drivers," he said. "So we didn't feel it was appropriate to supply alcohol at the clinics any more, particularly those down the country."

However some donors are less than pleased. David Fitzpatrick, 37, a postman from Gorey, Co Wexford, who has been giving blood for 20 years, said he was shocked when he did not receive his pint after a recent donation. "I thought they'd decided I was getting too old or they'd given me enough black stuff after 20 donations," he told The Sunday Times. "This won't deter me. My main reason for giving blood is to help people."

Fitzpatrick said he had always enjoyed his post-donation Guinness: "I was always informed that Guinness is good for replacing your iron levels and when is a better time to do that than after relieving yourself of a pint of blood?"

'Your Country, Your Call' competition looks for winning ideas to kick-start Irish economy

Your country, your call, Mary McAleese is heading an initiative to discover economic ideas that will lift the Irish economy

[Irish President Mary McAleese](#) has taken a leaf out of [Barack Obama](#)'s presidential campaign book by encouraging and empowering the Irish people to be the ones that make a change in their country.

Now Irish Americans are also being asked to contribute ideas to the "your country your call effort," and come up with the best ideas to kick start the Irish economy. The two winning entries will win close to \$150,000 dollars each.

"The goal is to pick two truly transformational proposals so big that, when implemented, could secure prosperity and jobs for [Ireland](#). Proposals that could help change the way we do things, allow businesses to grow, employment to be created and prosperity to flourish," the website explains.

Two winning ideas and their creators will win \$150,000 each, and the campaign is offering a development of up to \$850,000 to implement the proposals. The competition is open to people from every walk of Irish life.

The brainchild of the President's husband, Dr. Martin McAleese, the campaign encourages a sense of community and echoes of "Yes We Can".

At a time when unemployment is high and Government support is low, this fresh new project may be just what the country needs. "We are looking for Irish American input as well," Martin McAleese told [IrishCentral.com](#). "We know there is a deep affection for Ireland among Irish Americans and we look forward to their ideas and suggestions."

There are eight categories in which to submit ideas.

They are: Communications & Technology, Design, Engineering And Manufacturing, Education & The Arts, Energy & The Environment, Food & Agriculture, Health, Sport & Nutrition, and Professional Services. There is also an 'Other' category, leaving an extremely wide ambit for the ideas.

President McAleese appears in a video on the website, and speaks of the past, present, and future of Ireland. Our strength, she explains, is in working together.

"It's time to shake off the doldrums and get back on our feet," she says. "We have the will".

Now they just need to find the best way.
